Pastor's Heart

In the May edition of Christianity Today, Wess Stafford writes of being abused at a boarding school for missionary children while his parents were missionaries in Africa. The story is painful to read but redemptive in its ending.

Following the story letters poured into the editor. Below is Wess' response to those letters:

Ever since my story appeared in *Christianity Today*, the most common question I've heard is, "How did you move from pain to deliverance?" My reply to readers is a single word: forgiveness.

At age 17, I realized that those who hurt me would never apologize. They weren't even sorry. But I could no longer bear carrying the pain of my past, so I chose to forgive them anyway. "Get out of my heart. Get out of my mind. Get out of my life!" I remember saying. "What you did to me will not define me. You stole my childhood, but you cannot have the rest of my life. Get out - I forgive you!"

Since then I've learned that while God always requires us to forgive, forgiving isn't saying that what happened was okay. It doesn't release someone from the consequences of their actions. And doesn't require letting someone back into your life. It does mean giving up the right to seek re-

So, here is my counsel to those who have suffered: If you have never been able to forgive, you are allowing the person who hurt you to live rentfree in your heart. It's costing him nothing and costing you everything. Perhaps it's time for you to evict him through forgiveness.

The world has many evil people in it. More than I like to realize. What is more their evil often affects innocent children who grow up to be scared and scarred adults. Perhaps it is time for you to find the freedom from your past by forgiving someone who hurt you.

Refuse them free-rent. Forgive them, and in so doing, evict them.

Wess Stafford is the president and CEO of Compassion International and found his life's calling to advocate for children arising out of his own painful experiences. I am reminded of 2 Corinthians 1:3-4. Look it up and find a purpose in your pain.
