Pastor's Heart

In 1517 Martin Luther nailed "95 thesis" on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany (pronounced "Vittenberg"). The nailing was not unusual, this was the way scholars announced their intention to debate an issue or issues. One nailed the document on the door for all to read, as if the door were a large bulletin board. The act had been done many times before, though the subject matter was this

time explosive.

What really made the difference in this event, what caused it to become epic, world changing, and historically momentous, was that at about the same time in history the printing press was invented and came into full use. Suddenly the 95 thesis were published throughout Germany, and the world, for all to read. The miracle of God's timing was in full view.

The day was All-Saints Eve, known better to us as the hallowed eve or Halloween, October 31, 1517.

With this challenge to debate the theology of indulgences, the Protestant Reformation was begun. Though not direct lineage, the births of all protestant denominations find historic link with this event.

Other miracles of timing would arise to cement the birth of religious liberty and a renewed emphasis upon God's word. The printing press made possible the first edition of the scriptures in the common language of the people (in this case German). A major threat by the Turks (Islamic armies) caused the Catholic Emperor to cease his military campaign against the protestants in Germany and opened the way for free worship for Evangelicals. (Romans 8:28)

Because today marks Reformation Sunday, we will take time to explore the history and meaning of Luther and the Reformation for each of us. Apart from the Apostle Paul, no other has so guarded and promoted the principle of salvation by grace through faith in Jesus' sacrifice.

Tonight, worship and outreach will be united in Operation Neighborhood Harvest Fest. We will meet together in the Chapel for a short time of worship and prayer before commissioning our neighborhood missionaries to head out into the streets. Meet with us at 4:00 p.m. in the Chapel. There will not be a service at 6:00 p.m.

Postcard Blitz — Last week we introduced the prayer postcards for you to use as you reach out to your neighbors in prayer. Send one to every neighbor for whom you are praying. Let God use you in this! Already we have received calls to the office from 'neighbors' who spoke of the blessing they felt simply receiving the card.

Put a stamp on it, your return address and your phone number. Then keep praying everyday specifically for your neighbors. "The second is as the first: 'Love your neighbor as yourself."
